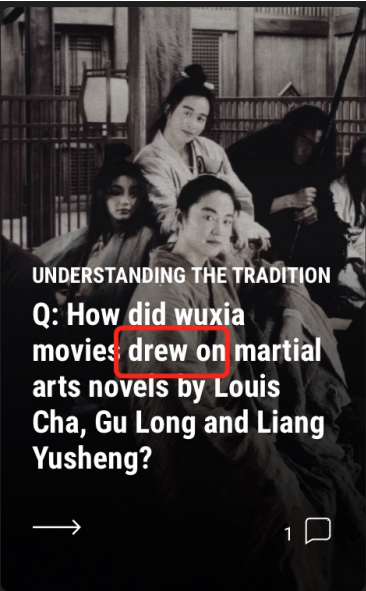

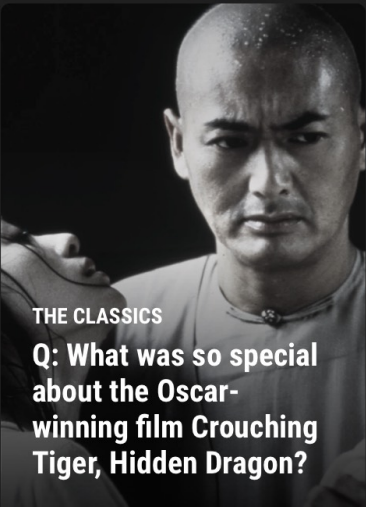

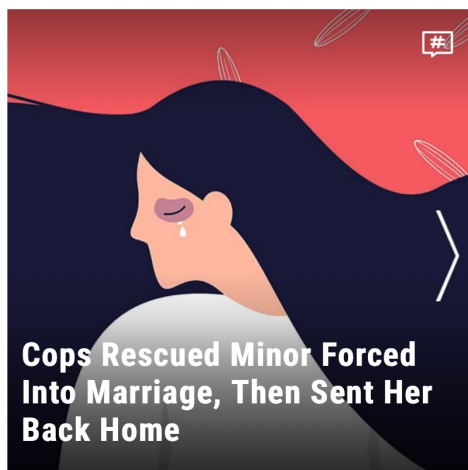

China's School Kids Go Goo-goo for 'Guka'

Guka, an activity where people decorate acrylic shapes with stickers, has become popular among China's schoolchildren because of its high entertainment value and low cost.



While "go goo-goo" and "go gaga" both involve becoming enthusiastic about something, there are some subtle differences between the two phrases that make them not entirely synonymous.



"Go goo-goo" typically conveys a sense of childlike wonder or innocence, while "go gaga" is often used to describe a more intense, sometimes irrational enthusiasm. "Go goo-goo" may suggest a sense of being charmed or captivated by something in a more gentle or innocent way, while "go gaga" can imply a more frenzied or obsessive enthusiasm.

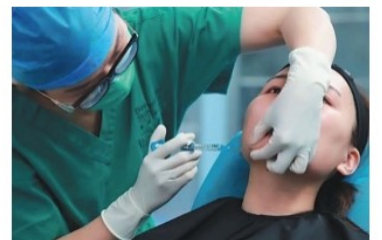

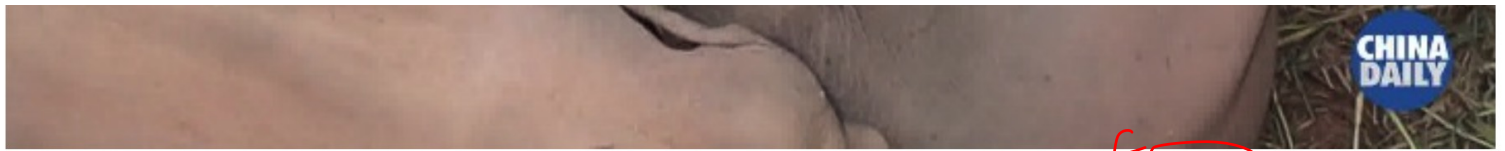

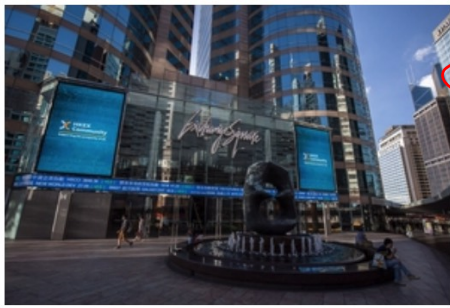

Hong Kong Shares Flirt With Correction as Growth Headwinds Rise

Doubts about the strength of China's economy spurred a rethink of the market outlook, wiping away most of the gains made by the city's benchmark stock index in a three-month surge

(Bloomberg) — Hong Kong's benchmark stock index wavered near correction levels Wednesday as growing geopolitical concerns and doubts over the strength of China's economy spurred a rethink on the market's outlook.

The Hang Seng Index advanced as much as 0.5%, erasing an earlier loss that took the gauge's drop since a Jan. 27 peak to over 10%. A sharp three-month surge in the measure has started to reverse in February as investors sought more evidence that the economy's recovery is on sure footing. Tech and property shares have led the latest decline.

What does it mean when a stock is in correction? ^

When a stock index falls more than 10% from a recent high, it is often said to have entered "correction" territory. That's a fairly neutral term for what can be an unpleasant experience to many investors.

The Hang Seng China Enterprises Index, which fell into a correction earlier this month, fell 1.3%. A gauge of Chinese tech shares trading in the city slumped 1.4%. On the mainland, the CSI 300 benchmark slid 0.9%.

The current earnings season is being scrutinized for business impact from China's Covid Zero exit. Figures on retail sales and industrial production for the first two months of 2023 are due mid-March, with data so far showing a mixed picture amid tepid sales of cars and homes.

The Hang Seng Index closed down 0.5%, taking its loss since a Jan. 27 peak to near 10%. China should embrace ChatGPT as part of education reform rather than banning it outright, the country's experts said.

With its ability to **answer questions** articulately and compose texts across a variety of subjects, the AI-powered chatbot developed by U.S. startup OpenAI has **captured the world's imagination** since it debuted in November. It had amassed an estimated 100 million monthly active users by January, making it the fastest-growing app of all time, according to a report by Swiss banking group UBS.

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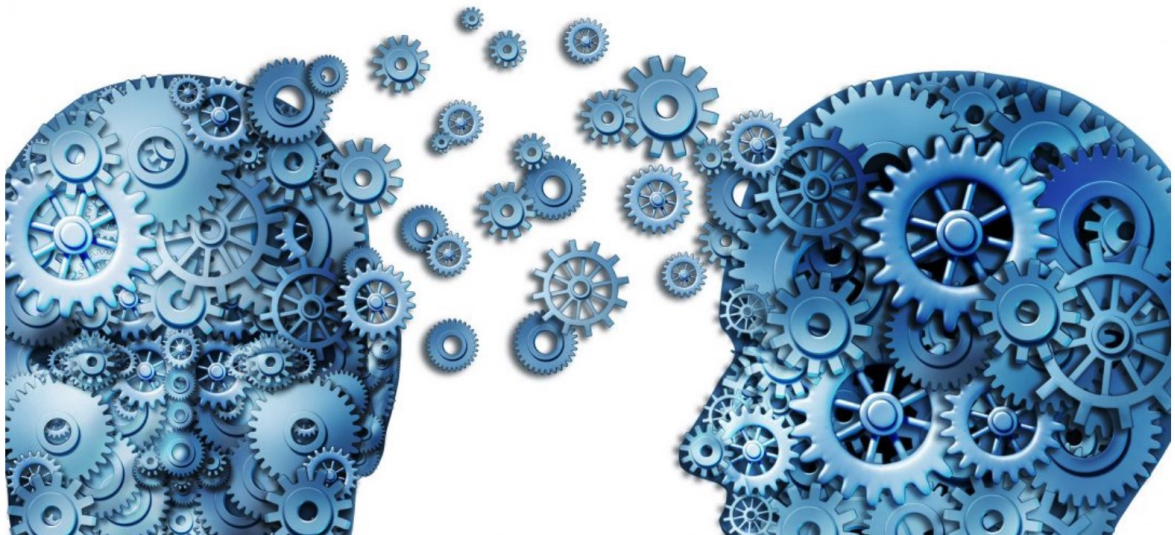

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AI-Generated Writing: A Hot Take from the Village Luddite on ChatGPT



I often jokingly describe myself as Capture's village [luddite](#) and, as my friends continued their holiday fun with ChatGPT (one used it to write a letter from Santa to his kids), my feelings were those of profound fear and loathing. I would say I reacted like an early-19th century British textile worker regarding a mechanized loom or knitting frame for the first time.

"Smash it," I thought. "Destroy it. *Kill it!*"

On ChatGPT, My Luddite Awakening, and Why I Hate Computers

In the three weeks since ChatGPT first started making waves on the internet, I have been repeatedly informed by my friends that the natural language processing AI's greatest strength is in its ability to be an efficient tool. In those three weeks, I have also never felt more like a Luddite.

It is not that I refute the fact that ChatGPT *is* a capable tool to support all manners of work, from copywriting to software development. In fact, I do concede (with contempt) that there is utility in having a piece of software that can supplement the creative process or a person's general lifestyle. In fact, I recently (and quite hypocritically) used ChatGPT to kickstart the writing process for an article at work. It was one of those articles you write for SEO optimisation, and I had been struggling with writing something so lifeless and stale, so I got the computer to do it, and then I edited and built on what it did. My manager said the final result read a little robotic, but after a few more edits it was good to go.

While I would readily wear the crown of the hypocrite without shame, I personally do not think my use of ChatGPT in this manner after posting 15+ anti-AI tweets was *actually* hypocritical. Because, when I talk about how ChatGPT makes me nervous, I am not talking about the program in itself.

I'm talking about the global system to which it was introduced.

Aside #2: You Can't 'Democratise' Art, Go Touch Grass

A common mindset among those passionate about AI art is the idea that they're making art more widely available. This is hilarious simply because not only has art always been publicly available, but it also remains one of the most under-funded and under-appreciated public amenities. Despite its ability to heal and provide solace, a large percentage of people who become notable artists have had to dedicate themselves to it without support or funding. They do not receive massive grants from silicon valley VCs. Public funding from governments is hard fought.

It is important to highlight that this technology only exists as a way to create profit. It was not created to be a tool. It was made to optimise and streamline processes that industries that were previously human led. The people who back it understand this. That's why its biggest supporters are not the artists themselves, but people in corporations that understand how it is yet another cog in the global game of numbers.

The actual artists, the people to whom writing, painting, drawing, music, and all other forms of expression have provided respite, look upon the art with disgust because they do not see a tool. They can tell that these programs were not made with them in mind. It wreaks of scientists meddling in another industry that can be reduced to 1s and 0s for no reason other than streamlining and capital and profit and stock prices.

Scientists that are so enamoured by the fact that they could do create such a technology, that they've not stopped to think for a second if they should.

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"The world no longer rewards you just for what you know. Baidu knows everything," he said. "The world rewards you for what you can do with what you know, and I think ChatGPT pushes us to work harder on this."

If students are only as smart as a smartphone, it means educators are not doing enough, he said. People should focus on developing human skills that actually are important, such as imagination and creativity, he said.

The arrival of artificial intelligence really pushes people to think hard about what education is and the purpose it serves, as well as what knowledge, skills, attitudes and values humans possess that complement artificial intelligence, he added.

"If you do not understand an algorithm, you will soon become the victim of that algorithm," he said. "There's a great risk that we'll just slavishly follow the answers that we get from ChatGPT rather than question it and create new knowledge."

A very important implication for education is to make young people ready to navigate ambiguity, manage complexity, distinguish fact from opinion and understand computational thinking as well as the ideas and nature of algorithms, Schleicher said.

As a device, ChatGPT is going to make learning much more interesting and powerful, but as a purpose and objective, humans need to work very hard to win that race with technology, he added.

Universities afraid to embrace ChatGPT have missed the point of education

Last Friday, the University of Hong Kong (HKU) banned its students from using ChatGPT or any other artificial intelligence-based tool for coursework, threatening to treat any use of such tools as plagiarism.

I asked a professor how the university intended to enforce the rule but did not get a straight answer. Instead, the professor told me what he thought should be the best practice in the age of AI, and I think that makes much more sense.

A business school in the US, I'm told, has done the opposite of what HKU announced last Friday. Its students are told that they must use ChatGPT for their coursework. Anyone who refuses to use the AI tool will be doing so knowingly at their own disadvantage.

A lecturer will then grade students using a new set of standards. Students will flunk the course if there is any factual error or logical inconsistency in their papers. Ensuring an error-free and logically proven work is now the bare minimum you need to get a pass.

To earn any score higher than that, students must demonstrate individual creativity or insight that separates their work from their classmates. Distinctions will now go to those who have their own voice or make a unique contribution to the subject matter.

The idea may sound drastic at first hearing, but it makes perfect sense.

Under the new grading system, students must check whatever is written by ChatGPT to see if the arguments are fact-based and valid. They need to learn how to properly source the information and cross-check it to ensure accuracy. Instead of finding a lazy solution, students must master the basic facts and weed out any logical gaps in their coursework just to get a pass.

Students who are creative, willing to think out of the box and who dare to explore new ideas will emerge as winners.

Instead of trying to turn back the clock and fight the future, the management and lecturers of this US school choose to embrace it fully. It is foolhardy to ban students from using this technology, which is evolving at a speed with which no school bureaucracy, no matter how well resourced and diligent, can hope to keep up.

ChatGPT is an extremely powerful tool, but it has no real insight – as anyone who has spent some time with it could testify. If it is perceived as a threat to our education system, it is only because our system is broken.

We may have valued rote learning too much and paid too little attention to creativity in the past. The arrival of ChatGPT is a wake-up call, telling us that much of the so-called knowledge that we have treasured may be the emperor's new clothes.

Only time will tell how successful this US business school is in its little experiment. But at least it is making a creative attempt at solving the new problem. The reaction from my alma mater, in comparison, is rather disappointing.

As I was writing this column, I could not resist the temptation of asking ChatGPT this question: "Should a school ban students from using ChatGPT in their coursework?"

The answer I received was rather nuanced and well argued. Perhaps HKU's management should give it a try as well.
